\$15,000 RAISED FOR RAL NER Rally, Solo and Club Racing Meet at NHMS

Over the weekend of August 3-4, all NER specialties converged on New Hampshire Motor Speedway to bring everyone in our region together for two days enjoying all the racing fun and motorsports action we have to offer.

On the NHMS road course, the road racing teams were competing in the fifth NERRC event of the year. This included 34 FV drivers coming together to honor Paul Faford. Outside the tunnel entrance to the track, the Autocross teams set up and ran an additional event outside of the 2019 points series, which included a dozen IT7 drivers taking a break from the road course to try their hand navigating cones. And the rally team organized a special Game-Tour-Adventure rally throughout the Lakes Region of New Hampshire that kicked off and ended at the NHMS gates.

The weekend highlight was the annual RAL Auction and Raffle. With over 40 items up for bid this year, members vied for items like Bruins tickets, racing gear, and an iconic Gulf open-face helmet. During the auction, the region presented our Regional Executive **Rich Currey** with a special helmet decorated and signed by the kids at the UMass Memorial Children's Hospital, letting him know the region is behind him during his own battle with cancer.

But the biggest fundraiser was the donations gathered to shave the head of **Serge Lentz**. Over \$5000 alone was collected to watch him lose his locks.

Overall, we had hundreds of NER members, crew, family and friends throughout the NHMS grounds participating in RAL events. And when all the online donations, t-shirt sales, auction items, and entries were tallied, the region was thrilled to present a check for over \$15,000 to the hopsital to support the children and families fighting cancer battles. The SCCA Time Trials and Track Night in America series continue to grow nationwide as these experiential programs attract new members and those looking to test the waters of on track racing.

2019 was the first year for the Time Trials National Tour, with one of the stops being a return to Thompson Speedway where the first SCCA timed competition was held in 1945. During the July 5-6 event, NER helped host what became the second largest Time Trials competition for the entire year.

For the coming year, NER will continue partnering with the Connecticut Autocross and Rally Team (CART) to host four Time Trials events, as well as a wide variety of Track Night in America days at tracks throughout the northeast.

As the popularity of these programs increases, the region is always looking for members to help facilitate the events. Already we are seeing the fruits of these programs as drivers transition from TT and TNiA to our CRE (Club Racing Experience) and eventually earn novice permits to continue on to club racing.

novice permits in 2019 to start club racing

It's long been a discussion point within the club: How do we grow our membership and integrate new motorsports enthusiasts into all the #funwithcars opportunities SCCA has to offer? From the national office to the local level, many members have been working towards this goal, with Track Night In America (TNiA) being one avenue that has experienced recent growth and success in this arena. Turns out – that's because it works.

This summer, two drivers that first showed up at a NER TNiA event received their Novice permits for road racing, and we can now expect to see them as regulars at road racing events across the northeast.

Testing the Waters with TNiA

"I found the TNiA event with only a day or so to go and it was full. But they advertised if I showed up that I could go on track touring laps," said Mark Lindsay of Connecticut. Those touring laps were so much fun, he came home that night and registered for his first full TNiA at Palmer Motorsports Park in May 2017. When he arrived, "I was about 10th in line of twenty, and it was Corvette, after M3, after Mustang," he describes, as he sat in his 2010 Honda Accord. "I was a bit nervous about what I had gotten myself into."

For Allen Briere, also of Connecticut, his first TNiA event was at Thompson Speedway in May 2015. With previous experience at HDPE and Autocross events, Allen had stepped away and not been involved with any motorsports activities for almost a decade. Then he ventured to the Thompson event. "The low cost of TNiA and afternoon track times were what drew me." He continued, "I had been interested in racing from a very young age, however the only exposure I had was with circle track racing, which seemed to be missing something. At an older age now, I can conclude it was excitement, thrill, and wanting to turn right."

Both men were hooked after that first TNiA. "I could not believe how much fun it was, especially for the price," Mark said. "The atmosphere was great, and everyone was very passionate about cars and driving fast. This was something I was missing in my daily routine." Allen added, "The first thing that impacted me was how approachable and helpful the SCCA team was. I will always remember how this event reignited my interest in motorsports."

Moving Into Road Racing

With only their street cars, both drivers continued to attend TNiA events, trying different locations, but both recognizing that they would eventually want more. "I ended up logging 72 lapping sessions in three years and in May 2017 I located an old ITB VW GTI log-booked racecar. I purchased the car, and through the friendships I made in NER's TNiA staff, they held my hand, gave me a list of safety items needed, and helped me set a target date for a CRE at Thompson," said Allen. Mark eventually attended a Palmer road race to learn about the different classes and decide what would be best for him. "After that event, I was sure Spec Miata was for me," he said. "It is a huge class with someone to race at every speed and lots of vendor support. It is also competitive in many other classes, so I could double dip if I wanted."

The SCCA website clearly laid out the path to a competition license for Mark, but the most timeconsuming part was going to be building his car. "I looked into renting, but that was too expensive. I looked at buying a finished car, but I couldn't find a car I could afford built like I would want. In the end, I settled on building the car with help from everyone – family, friends, vendors, other competitors and everyone I talked to at SCCA."

Mark's first weekend being in a race suit on track brought out the nerves. "It was raining all weekend and I didn't want to throw it all away before it began. The car was brand new to me, so it took a while to be comfortable. It was exactly what I was hoping for though. I had great battles all weekend and was moving forward every session. I couldn't have asked for a better start!"

Now a Novice Racer

"Once you're strapped into a car, no one knows you're a novice," Allen remarks. "My first race weekend, I felt prepared and looked forward to seeing my new racing family."

When asked how TNiA helped prepare them for road racing, both drivers immediately commented on the friendliness and helpfulness of the SCCA staff. "It's a sense of family," Allen explains. "They provided an outlet for my desire, advice and coaching. The low stress level of TNiA is 100% the reason I am where I am. It was so easy."

"Nearly everyone staffing TNiA are racing themselves. They have a passion and it is contagious," Mark continues. "TNiA helped me get familiar with local tracks and helped build my confidence. That first weekend racing, already knowing the track really helped with my nerves." Peter Morrison and Greg Amy practically dragged Allen to that driver school at Thompson. Peter offered to conduct the Annual Tech on site, and Greg "didn't let up. He was messaging and texting me all through the morning session to 'Just Get Here!', and he'd take care of everything."

After arriving two hours late, Kathy Barnes walked Allen through registration and missing paperwork, Peter did the annual tech, and "before I knew it, I was strapping in and out on the track for the school." He added, "The day was a blur, becoming comfortable with door-todoor racing was completely different, and by the end of the day, I had my little Novice book. To be completely honest, it all happened so smoothly that when the day was over, I asked myself, 'Did I just become a racecar driver??? YES, Yes I did!""

Advice for Others

Since most TNiA staff are the same people working road racing events, both drivers recommend simply asking the question "how do I get involved?" Ask questions about the different classes and how things work. Spectating at a road racing event is another way to learn more. Mark notes, "Every competitor I have met loves to race and is happy to talk about it." "Just come say hello or offer to help out," Allen adds. He concludes, "SCCA has an open door, staff that helps you with everything, and is genuinely concerned with you enjoying your time.

What's Next

Now that these two drivers have their competition licenses, watch for them at NER events in the near future. Allen will be bringing his ITB VW GTI to tracks, while also building another 2006 VW GTI to run in T3 at Time Trials. Mark's Spec Miata will be at all the NER events, with "a few reach tracks thrown in – Watkins Glen and VIR are definitely on the list."

As a club, NER would like to thank both these drivers for sharing their personal stories and experience with both TNiA, CRE, and their pathways to competition road racing. We are excited to welcome them into the road racing family and thrilled that they have found many ways to fuel their motorsports passion through all the programs and specialties SCCA has to offer.



PRESERVINGHISTORY

Donna Stevens Tackles 70 Years of NER Records

Over two tractor-trailers full of materials. That's what arrived at the International Motor Racing Research Center's (IMRRC) SCCA Collection off-site storage facility in 2017 to begin the process of cataloguing and archiving all the papers, publications and photos of the Sports Car Club of America.

At the same time, the New England Region recognized our own cache of historical documents was in need of help. Ted Goddard served as the Region Archivist beginning in the late 1960s. When he passed away in 2016, all the materials he collected and stored at his home were moved into a storage unit. 10 filing cabinets, 200 boxes, 30 membership binders and many other items. Almost 70 years of history, but without any cohesive organization, inventory, or catalog.

The board realized we needed someone to organize and preserve this treasure trove of materials. Donna Stevens was the answer.

Starting One Box at a Time

Recently retired, and living in New Hampshire near where the materials were stored, Donna heard about the project and she was curious. "I decided to take a look for myself and couldn't believe how much was there," she exclaimed. "I knew then that the project needed someone who had been around for 45 years and could relate to the documents and the members of the past."

"The first year was challenging," she starts. "Taking each box, one-by-one, and deciding what would be the best way to catalog all the documents." She decided to create an Index sorted by year and focus - Admin, Solo, Rally,



and Racing. The next step was emptying and removing all the rusted filing cabinets and installing new storage shelves.

As she makes her way through each box, Donna carefully reviews each item. "I have to decide if it should be kept and recorded, shredded, or transferred to the IMRRC, the North East Motor Sports Museum, or another venue."

To date, Donna is in her third year of sorting and cataloguing documents, and estimates she's about 50% completed. "We still have roughly 129 boxes that are untouched, with additional boxes continuing to be sent to us throughout the year."

Finding Gold

As Donna makes her way through the vast piles of materials, she's struck gold with a few unique finds. The two most important historical documents she uncovered so far have been "The New England Region Sports Car Club of America Incorporated (A Massachusetts Corporation 1952) BY-LAWS", which was published on January 1, 1960; as well as the "Commonwealth of Massachusetts 'ARTICLES OF ORGANIZATION' for the New England Region, SCCA Inc, dated August 28, 1952. These were the founding documents for our region, registered with the state.

However, "One of the coolest items I found is a relic Rally collection. This included Rally indicator instruments, a Rally handbook written by Larry Reid in 1959, various hand-written rally tables, and a Rally Master timesheet converter" Donna says.



The Work Continues

With over half the materials still to be processed, Donna continues to work diligently preserving and recording the history of our region and club. She is grateful for all the help she's received, from members sending in their own collections to taking the time to just look at stacks of old photos to identify drivers, tracks and events. James Ray has joined with Donna in helping with this task by posting photos regularly on the region's Facebook page. Members are able to quickly spot markers to help with identification and cataloguing of the images.

Any one who wishes to donate New England Region documents, records and results, can contact Donna and she will arrange for transportation. Then stop by and check out the SCCA Collection at the IMRRC the next time you're near Watkins Glen.







63 NER Drivers and Workers Converged on VIR

This year, the 56th Runoffs made a first-ever visit to the 18-turn, 3.27-mile circuit of VIRginia International Raceway located along the border of North Carolina and Virginia. Nearly 600 SCCA club racers competed for the title of National Champion in 28 classes over the week of October 7-13, 2019.

As one of the largest regions represented at the Runoffs, NER sent 39 drivers competing in 19 classes and 24 volunteer workers. At the end of the week, NER claimed 5 podium finishes and 17 Top 10 finishing positions. The crowning jewel for the week was the T4 National Championship title **Nick Leverone** claimed during the first race of the event.

One of the truly amazing performances of the week was during the B-Spec race. **Travis Washay** started the race dead-last on the grid, in the 26th position. After 14 hard-charging laps, Travis just missed a podium spot, but finished 4th overall.

Another highlight from the week was the Wednesday Night Paddock Party. NER helped host a paddockwide event - similar to our LRP Paddock Crawl - for all competitors, workers, crew, friends and family, putting on what was considered one of the best parties for the week.

Modified FWD Champion and 3 other RallyX Podiums

The 13th annual DirtFish SCCA RallyCross National Championship was held once again in Indianola, Iowa September 20-22. The weekend brought a mix of weather conditions that resulted in challenging competition for the 7 NER drivers that towed to the midwest. All the grass, rain and eventual mud created both fun and challenging courses over the exciting three days of the event.

Michael Gallant and **Chris Zanis** started Saturday a little slower than expected with the shared VW GTI they brought for Modified FWD. But after the rains came, Michael came out swinging on Sunday, beating the leader by 6 seconds in the first run in the mud. His second run was once again blazing, propelling him to the Championship title by a mere 0.458 seconds. Due to cone penalties, Chris rounded out the podium claiming the 3rd place trophy.

The NER team also made a dominant showing in the Stock FWD category. **Kim Hapgood** found a spot on the podium in 2nd place with her Acura Integra, with **Warren Elliott** and **Chang Ho Kim** finishing in 4th and 6th.




RALLY REVIVAL Great American Mountain Rally Revival of 2019

The original Great American Mountain Rally lured rally teams from around the globe to congregate in the mountains of New England on Thanksgiving weekends from 1953-1957. A GAMR Revival was the brain-child of road-rally enthusiast **Gary Hamilton**, and his mentor, veteran international road-rally guru **Steve McKelvie**. The 2019 running of the GAMRR took place October 25-27. It kicked off from Saratoga Springs, traveled through the High Peaks of the Adiorndacks, and concluded three days later in Bennington, Vermont.

32 cars participated in the 2019 GAMRR, being divided into three categories. There were 4 "Original" cars, those from 1957 or earlier. The largest category was 1958-1978 "Classic" models, with 12 entires. And the rest were "Modern" cars, those built after 1978.

Greg Davis, in his 1952 Hudson Hornet pictured below, chronciled his adventures participating in the 2019 GAMRR, thoroughly enjoying his time, even though a brake problem prevented him, and the three other Original cars from finishing. **Edward and Ruth Sain**, in their 2015 Highlander took the overall win.
